

National Order of the Arrow Conference



On Sunday, August 2, the Tsoiotsi Tsogalii Lodge NOAC delegation boarded two buses and departed from Woodfield Scout Preservation beginning their journey to Michigan State University. The group was made up of 75 Arrowmen, 56 Scouts and 19 adults. The first day's travel ended in Findley, Ohio where lodge members checked into their hotel and enjoyed dinner at local establishments. Early Monday morning everyone put on their light blue lodge polo shirt and headed on to Michigan. The buses arrived in East Lansing midday and after a fast food lunch the lodge went to the university to check in. Tsoiotsi Tsogalii Lodge was housed in Hubbard South, the dormitory that was the furtherest possible location from the center of NOAC activites.



Following a welcoming Orientation session the delegates moved into their assigned rooms and got settled. The highlight of Monday was the Opening Show. The 15,000 delegates and staff gathered in the Breslin Center for the start of a week of celebration. The theme of the opening show was "It Sparks With Us." Everyone attending NOAC received a special Centennial OA Sash that was to be worn only during this week. The show began with all delegates taking off their white sashes and putting on the special red sash. The four Region Chiefs led to the stage processions of Scouts carrying poles displaying large pocket flaps from

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each of the lodges attending NOAC. The National Chief and National Vice Chief welcomed all to a great week of Scouting. Donnie Stephens, National Vice Chief, gave a keynote address emphasizing the role of the OA in providing service and promoting the NOAC theme, "It Starts With Us".

Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday were days for training, competition, fellowship and gatherings. There were lots of special exhibits from the "GEO" (Goodman Edson Observatory-NOAC Museum), Legacy Display Tent (where Lodge Rocks, Crate Lids, and Lodge Histories were on display), and the HUB. Delegates went in different directions each day as each Arrowman pursued items that interested him. Some members spent much of their time at the Munn Ice Arena participating in American Indian Activities. Others visited the HUB and became OA Warriors by conquering a challenging obstacle course. Some members traded patches whenever time allowed.

Tuesday night's show brought the 15,000 delegates together again. The show opened with an amazing juggler, Charles Peachock, who gained fame performing on *America's Got Talent*. Former Secretary of Defense Dr. Robert M. Gates, President of the BSA, addressed the delegates on their role as future leaders of the country. The closing act was "Maddie & Tae", a very attractive young female duo singing country music.

On Wednesday morning Tsoiotsi Tsogalii Lodge attended the NOAC signature session where members learned "The Secret to Ruling the World". The show that evening had a theme, "100 Arrows: The OA's Centennial Commemoration". DSA recipients were introduced and the highlight of the evening was the keynote speech by National Chief Alex Call who introduced a special



effort, "#Dare To Do". Arrowmen were encouraged to share their good deeds done in the next 100 days following the conference.

Thursday was dominated by American Indian Activities. Indian Dancers and Ceremonialists completed their competitions and were recognized during the "Night of Champions". **Wilson Triplett** of our lodge was one of the ten finalists in the Grass Dance competition. The Ceremonies team placed in the top 10 in clothing judging. A Gathering of Eagles and the Grand Hodag were also held that night. Friday was the final full day of NOAC and it started with a Conference-wide service project. The 15,000 delegates gathered in the Spartan football stadium. A short program was presented featuring Eagle Scout and reality TV star Creek Stewart. A card stunt was performed showing the NOAC's theme. The stadium was then emptied by MSU staff to help them practice their evacuation plans. The rest of the day was dedicated to the Centennial Festival.





As part of the OA's Legacy Project Tsoiotsi Tsogalii produced a Legacy Lid, Lodge History Book, and a Lodge Rock. These were displayed in The HUB during the conference. The committee overseeing this project reviewed each lodge's submissions and awarded ribbons to the top ten in each of the three categories. Tsoiotsi Tsogalii's Lodge History Book was recognized as "Exemplar" declaring it to be one of the ten best of the 200+ books submitted.

The highlight of the whole NOAC for many delegates was the Closing Show, themed "The Order of the Arrow Presents 'The Tri-Fletchers' ". The show featured a professional theatrical presentation across the arena's floor staged as a Boy Scout camp. This was followed by an amazing multimedia 3-D video presentation. The enthusiastic crowd enjoyed karaoke sing alongs, fireworks, and final farewell.

On Saturday morning all the delegations packed up to return home filled with a great spirit for the Order of the Arrow and inspired to Dare To Do as It Starts With Us. Tsoiotsi Tsogalii Lodge boarded the two buses and headed south. Saturday night was spent in Ohio with the final miles covered on Sunday and a return to Woodfield. It was a great event enjoyed by all!!!



In addition to the 75 lodge delegates there were 25 lodge members that served on NOAC staff. The areas covered included Training, Medical Services, Shows, American Indian Activities, Trading Post, and ARC.

Following NOAC Ken Shahbaz stepped down as Lodge Adviser. He was replaced by Sue Hampton.

On September 11 – 13 the lodge held an Ordeal at Woodfield Scout Preservation. On Friday evening almost 150 candidates arrived at camp for their induction into the Order of the Arrow. Staff and Elangomats



gathered to organize the candidates into clans and begin the Ordeal. The evening began with Scouts and Scouters getting acquainted with each other and preparing for a weekend of silence, scant food, and cheerful service. Following ceremonies the clans were off to bed. Saturday was warm and pleasant and service projects were the order of the day. Brush was cleared, buildings painted, and facilities repaired



until afternoon when showers arrived. The candidates enjoyed a fine dinner then their Induction ceremonies. The evening ended with a fine cracker barrel celebration.

This Council Camporee resembled a Section Conclave and the lodge provided a full schedule of activites. Scouts set up camp on Friday evening then gathered for an evening show which featured a welcome from the Lodge chief, Scout Executive, and Council President. They learned a little about the history of the OA in the Old North State Council area then were entertained by a juggler/magician.

Temperatures dropped into the 30s on Saturday morning, but the sunny day warmed up nicely. Troops were
