

Jackson Benes made it to the Semi-Finals of Men's Grass Dance.


Ben Cole represented the lodge in Men's Straight Dance.


Tsogalii Lodge 70. The lodge gave out Red Bird mints, a sweet treat manufactured in Lexington, NC.
